Lincoln University's acclaimed Art Collection will include a specially commissioned sculpture by 2028, ready for the University's 150th anniversary. The 2024 Annual Appeal is an opportunity for you to donate towards this unique work of art which will be located alongside Memorial Hall.

The sculpture will interpret and celebrate the essential role of legumes and nitrogen fixation in natural and managed ecosystems including the importance of nitrogen-fixing plants in agriculture and environmental sustainability.

The artwork also acknowledges the research conducted in this field by Aotearoa New Zealand scientists and their contribution to understanding this fundamental biological process.

Master of Science student Marion Dumaine, the 2024 Don Hulston Foundation Scholarship awardee, is a fine example of the connection between scholarships and the advancement of scientific knowledge.

Marion’s research concerns the reduction of phosphorous leaching from sub-surface tile drainage systems and the effect of land application of treated effluent on greenhouse gas emissions.
